





The Nicene Creed

Leader and People

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed Dunstan, and all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever, **AMEN**.



Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Part of our rich Anglican tradition is the commemoration of significant figures in the history of The Episcopal Church who have set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us. These noteworthy individuals are remembered on the liturgical calendar of the Church, and their biographies are anthologized in the book, Lesser Feasts and Fasts. This week we remember The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

Martin Luther King, Jr. was added to the Episcopal Church's Calendar of Saints in 1985. The Church recognized King's significant impact on American life, justifying his inclusion despite being a non-Anglican and less than 50 years after his death. King is commemorated on April 4, the date of his assassination, following the tradition of remembering martyrs on their death day. The Episcopal Church honors him as a "Pastor and Martyr," acknowledging his role in leading the civil rights



movement and his Christian faith. This inclusion reflects the Church's commitment to social justice and racial equality, aligning with King's message of non-violent resistance to oppression.



Dietrich Bonhoeffer, a German Lutheran pastor and theologian, is commemorated as a saint on **April 9**, the anniversary of his execution in 1945. Bonhoeffer's inclusion in the Church's calendar of saints recognizes his profound impact on Christian thought and his courageous resistance to Nazi oppression. He is remembered for his theological writings, particularly *The Cost of Discipleship*, which critiqued "cheap grace" and emphasized the importance of active faith. Bonhoeffer's commitment to his beliefs led him to return to Germany during World War II, where he joined

the resistance movement and helped Jews escape. His execution, just weeks before the liberation of the concentration camp where he was held, solidified his status as a modern martyr. Bonhoeffer's life and teachings continue to inspire Christians worldwide.
