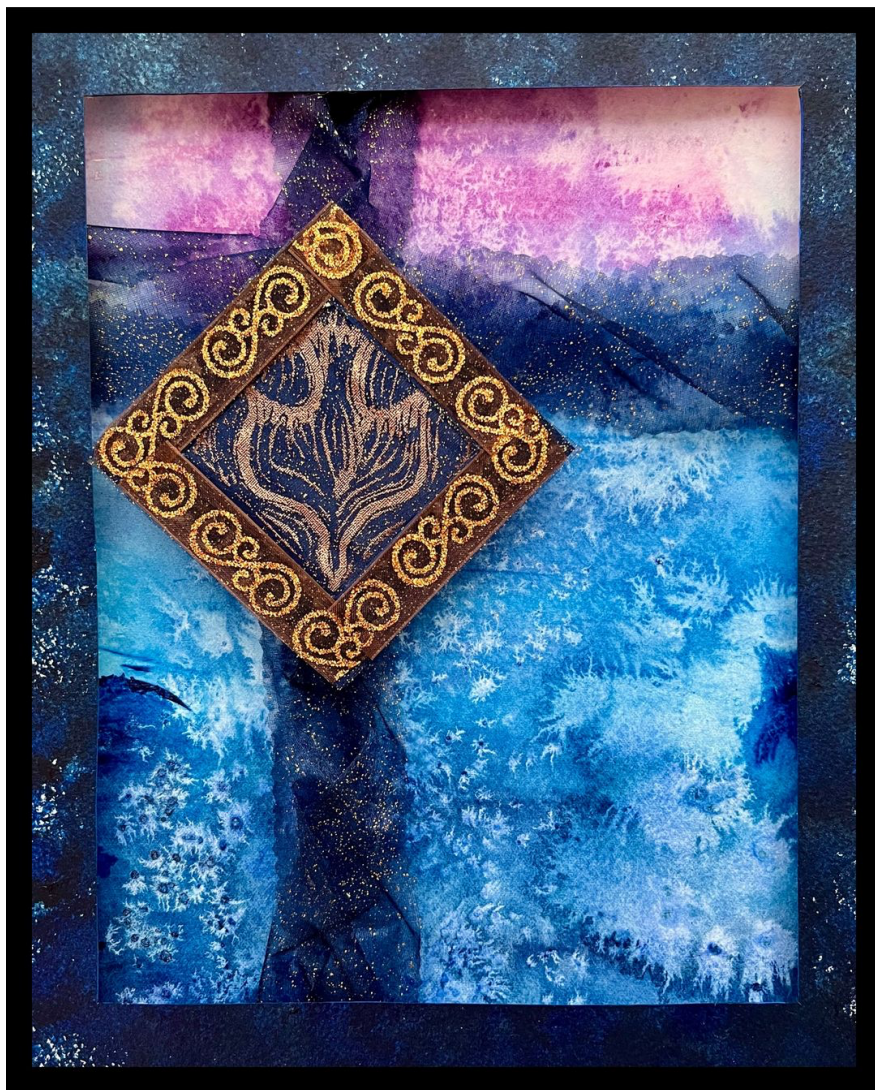

The Nicene Creed

Presider and People

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come, Amen.

The Prayers of the People

In love and humility, let us now pray for the Church and for the world.

God of love, we pray for your Church: For *Sean*, our Presiding Bishop; for *Mariann*, our Bishop, and *Eugene*, our Assisting Bishop; for *Hosam*, Archbishop in Jerusalem; for all lay and ordained ministers; and for all who seek you in the community of the faithful. Equip us to carry out your work of reconciliation in the world. God of love,
hear our prayer.

God of freedom, we pray fervently for peace and unity among all the peoples of the world, especially in Haiti; India and Pakistan; Israel, Gaza, and Iran; Sudan and South Sudan; and Ukraine and Russia. We lift before you those entrusted with the leadership of our own troubled nation, that they would have the humility and compassion to serve the common good. As well, we remember those in our Foreign Service and Emergency Services, and members and veterans of our Armed Forces at home and abroad. God of freedom,
hear our prayer.

continued

God of justice, we pray for the earth, your Creation entrusted to our care: For the animals and birds, the mountains and oceans, and all parts of Creation that have no voice of their own. Stir up in us the will to protect the earth and all its resources, that we may be faithful stewards of your beauty and abundance. God of justice,
hear our prayer.

God of peace, we pray for this community: For our local leaders; for our schools and markets; for our neighborhoods and workplaces. Kindle in every heart a desire for equality, respect, and opportunity for all. Give us courage to strive for peace and to speak out against hatred and violence, evil and prejudice, beginning here at home. God of peace,
hear our prayer.

God of mercy, help us keep our promise to seek and serve Christ in all persons. We remember those in any need or trouble, including refugees and prisoners, the lonely and despairing, and the sick and suffering. We pray especially for the people commended to our Parish Prayer List (*see p. 17*), as well as for those we name now, silently or aloud:

Pause for prayers of petition or intercession

God of mercy,
hear our prayer.

God of grace, we pray for those who have died: For the faithful in every generation who have worked for justice; for prophets who called us to racial reconciliation; for martyrs who died because of hatred; and for all the communion of saints. We remember especially this week *Joyanna Moy, the victims of the Air India plane crash*, and those we name now, silently or aloud:

God of grace,
hear our prayer.

God of joy, we thank you for all the blessings of this life, especially this week for the 250th birthday of the *United States Army*, the 55th wedding anniversary this past week of *Bob and Ellie Tupper*, and for those good things we name now, silently or aloud:

God of joy,
hear our prayer.

The Presider continues

Faithful God, on this day on which we honor the fathers and father figures in our lives, we ask that you give them wisdom and humility for the task of parenting, and the strength to do well by their children and by you. We remember in particular:

fathers who love and sacrifice for their families, and who raise children
to achieve dreams thought beyond reach;
those men who, though without children of their own,
like fathers have nurtured and cared for us;
fathers who have failed to be a source of
strength, comfort, and protection for their children;
fathers who have lost a child;
those for whom this day is painful; and
fathers who have died, whom we now name:

Enlarge our vision of life, O God, and make us bold in our hope: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, let our cry come to you, **Amen.**

The Confession and Absolution

Deacon Let us confess our sins against God and one another.

A brief silence

Deacon God of all mercy,
and People **we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the evil we have done, and the evil done on our behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will, Amen.**

Presider Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life, **Amen.**

Please stand, kneel, or sit.

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation.

Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: **“Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.”**

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: **“Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me.”**

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ. Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit and live as Christ’s Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of all your children, that with the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed Dunstan, and all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever, **AMEN.**

And now, as our savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven,

hallowed be thy Name,

The musical score is for the hymn "Glorify Thy Name" by D. Adkins, set to the tune "O Trinity of bless'd light" by F. J. Haydn. It is arranged for piano and three-part vocal harmony (Soprano, Alto, and Tenor). The score is in 4/4 time and B-flat major. It consists of three systems of music. The background is a gel-plate monoprint where I used salt to get the swirly, cosmic effect. It is meant to evoke God-the-Creator, who spoke into the chaos of the cosmos and created our world. The cross (made of ribbon) is there to represent Jesus, who was ALSO God, and who came to us in the flesh to help us understand God's love. The descending dove (printed from a stamp I carved and surrounded with more ribbon) is ALSO God, in that mysterious presence we cannot see but that who is with us to this day, giving us comfort and strength and, we hope, guidance.
