

The Epistle: 2 Timothy 2:8-15

Lector A Reading from the Second Letter to Timothy:

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.







Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Part of our rich Anglican tradition is the commemoration of significant figures in the history of The Episcopal Church who have set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us. This week we remember and give thanks for two such noteworthy individuals:

Edith Cavell (1865–1915), a British nurse and Anglican, is revered in the Episcopal Church for her compassion and sacrificial courage in World War I. Cavell treated wounded soldiers from all sides without discrimination, embodying Christ's command to love even one's enemies. She helped hundreds of Allied troops escape German-occupied Belgium, an act of mercy that led to her arrest and execution by firing squad after a court-martial. Her refusal to harbor bitterness, even toward those who condemned her, inspired generations; her famous last words—"Patriotism is not enough. I must have no hatred or bitterness toward anyone."—reflect a profound Gospel ethic. Cavell also advanced nursing in Belgium, founding pioneering schools and raising standards for the profession. She exemplified the call to heal, to reconcile, and to courageously confront injustice for the sake of love. She is commemorated in the Episcopal Church because her sacrificial service and uncompromising faith in the face of death mirror the Church's highest values: mercy, courage, and reconciliation. She is remembered on the liturgical calendar today, October 12.

Samuel Isaac Joseph Schereschewsky (1831–1906) is remembered in the Episcopal Church for his extraordinary life as a missionary, Bishop, and Bible translator in China. Born in Lithuania to Jewish parents and originally trained for the rabbinate, Schereschewsky's conversion to Christianity was marked by searching intellect and spiritual courage. After coming to America, he joined the Episcopal Church and responded to a call to mission in China. He translated the Bible and Book of Common Prayer into Mandarin, making the Christian message accessible to millions. A gifted linguist, he did translation work even after becoming paralyzed, typing thousands of pages with one finger. Schereschewsky also founded St. John's College in Shanghai, expanding opportunities for Chinese youth and church leaders. He became Bishop of Shanghai but resigned due to ill health, continuing his work quietly. His perseverance, inclusivity, and dedication to sharing the Gospel in the language and culture of the people he served and His witness to steadfast service amidst adversity illustrates the Church's commitment to mission, translation, and cross-cultural understanding. Samuel Schereschewsky's feast day is October 14. ~ Curated by Ray Donnelly
