The Lesson: Acts 9:36-43

Lector A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

Now in Joppa there was a disciple whose name was Tabitha, which in Greek is Dorcas. She was devoted to good works and acts of charity. At that time she became ill and died. When they had washed her, they laid her in a room upstairs. Since Lydda was near Joppa, the disciples, who heard that Peter was there, sent two men to him with the request, "Please come to us without delay." So Peter got up and went with them; and when he arrived, they took him to the room upstairs. All the widows stood beside him, weeping and showing tunics and other clothing that Dorcas had made while she was with them. Peter put all of them outside, and then he knelt down and prayed. He turned to the body and said, "Tabitha, get up." Then she opened her eyes, and seeing Peter, she sat up. He gave her his hand and helped her up. Then calling the saints and widows, he showed her to be alive. This became known throughout Joppa, and many believed in the Lord. Meanwhile he stayed in Joppa for some time with a certain Simon, a tanner.



As you are able, please remain standing for the Eucharistic Prayer during Eastertide. Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God.

Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love.

Then the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you. On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said:

"Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for theremembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again he gave thanks to you, gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Now gathered at your table, O God of all creation, and remembering Christ crucified and risen, who was and is and is to come, we offer to you our gifts of bread and wine, and ourselves, a living sacrifice.

Pour out your Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Body and blood of Christ. Breathe your Spirit over the whole earth and make us your new creation, the Body of Christ given for the world you have made.

In the fullness of time bring us, with the Blessed Virgin Mary, Blessed Tanitha, Blessed Dunstan, and all your saints, from every tribe and language and people and nation, to feast at the banquet prepared from the foundation of the world.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever, **AMEN**.

Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Frances Perkins is recognized as a saint in the Episcopal Church for her profound integration of faith and public service, her pioneering role as a social reformer, and her enduring impact on American society. Her feast day is commemorated on **May 13** each year, honoring her as a "Public Servant and Prophetic Witness."

Perkins was the first woman to serve in a U.S. presidential cabinet, holding the position of Secretary of Labor under Franklin D. Roosevelt for twelve years. In this role, she was instrumental in shaping New Deal legislation, including the creation of Social Security, unemployment insurance, and labor protections that transformed the lives of millions during and after the Great Depression. Her advocacy for industrial safety and just labor laws was rooted in a deep sense of justice and compassion, values she attributed to her Christian faith.

A lifelong Episcopalian, and a member of St James' Episcopal Church on Capitol Hill, Perkins's faith was not merely private but a wellspring for her public actions. She regularly participated in church life, sought spiritual guidance, and made monthly retreats even during her busiest years in government. She believed that serving the "secular and worldly life" of her neighbors was a way of serving God, viewing her work as a living sacrifice offered for the common good. Her vision was of a society where all could "live in health and decency," and she tirelessly pursued justice and protection for the vulnerable, embodying the call to love one's neighbor as oneself.

The Episcopal Church recognized Perkins as a saint in 2009, not for performing miracles, but for her faithful witness in public life and her prophetic challenge to society to pursue justice and mercy. Her life continues to inspire, reminding the faithful that sainthood can be found in the pursuit of social justice, and that faith can – and should – shape the structures of society for the better.

Thurgood Marshall is honored as a saint in the Episcopal Church for his unwavering commitment to justice, equality, and human dignity, all deeply rooted in his Christian faith. Marshall was not only the first African American to serve as a Justice on the U.S. Supreme Court, but also a pioneering civil rights lawyer whose legal acumen and moral courage reshaped American society. He and his family were active members of St Augustine's Episcopal Church in Southwest Washington.

As chief counsel for the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund, he successfully argued that "separate but equal" educational facilities were inherently unequal, leading to the desegregation of American public schools and striking a decisive blow against institutional racism. Over his career, he won 29 out of 32 cases before the Supreme Court, each one chipping away at the legal foundations of segregation and discrimination.

On the Supreme Court, Marshall became a powerful advocate for the marginalized, using his own experiences with racial prejudice to inform a judicial philosophy centered on protecting the constitutional rights of all Americans-especially the poor, women, and criminal defendants.

Marshall's sainthood in the Episcopal Church is based not only on his legal accomplishments but also on his Christian commitment to racial justice, equality, and the inherent worth of every person. He lived out his faith through his work, believing that all people are created equal in the eyes of God and deserve dignity and opportunity. His life stands as a testament to the power of faith in action and the pursuit of justice as a sacred calling. The Episcopal Church remembers Marshall on **May 17.** ~ Curated by Ray Donnelly

*Artist's Reflection: "St. Tabitha"

In Acts 9:36-43, we are introduced to "a disciple whose name was Tabitha" and who "was devoted to good works and acts of charity." She is the ONLY woman named as a disciple in the New Testament. The part of the narrative that caught my attention was that, as Tabitha lay dying, her woman friends stood around her with the clothing she had made for them. She was apparently a marvelous weaver and seamstress, and she is now considered the Patron Saint of seamstresses and fiber arts. It caught my fancy to do an icon of this Saint. This piece uses hand-dyed fabrics and embroidery, and the saint is holding a basket of yarn (actually embroidery thread) and a sewing needle. I don't do faces very often, but for St. Tabitha I tried to depict her as a kind and perceptive woman.
