

The Nicene Creed



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Part of our rich Anglican tradition is the commemoration of significant figures in the history of The Episcopal Church who have set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us. These noteworthy individuals are remembered on the liturgical calendar of the Church, and their biographies are anthologized in Lesser Feasts and Fasts. This week we feature **Thomas Gallaudet and Henry Winter Syle**, who are recognized as saints for their pioneering ministry among the deaf and hearing-impaired community; their feast day is this coming Wednesday, **August 27**.

Thomas Gallaudet (1822–1902) is known as the "Father of Episcopal missionary work among the hearing impaired." He founded St. Ann's Church for Deaf-Mutes in New York City in 1852, the first church designed for deaf Episcopalians. His work led to the establishment of congregations for the deaf in many cities and helped advance education and spiritual support for the deaf community within the Church. Henry Winter Syle (1846–1890) was deaf from early childhood and, under Gallaudet's mentorship, became the first deaf person ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1876. Syle's leadership expanded the ministry to the deaf, and he founded All Souls' Church for the Deaf in Philadelphia, the first Episcopal church built specifically for the hearing impaired. His ordination paved the way for greater acceptance and inclusion of people with disabilities in religious life.
