The Lesson: Acts 11:1-18

Lector A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saying, 'Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved.' And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."



As you are able, please remain standing for the Eucharistic Prayer during Eastertide. We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be

the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

History on Our Doorstep Saturday, June 7, 10 a.m. Glen Echo Park

In the summer of 1960, the Glen Echo Amusement Park, located just around the corner from St. Dunstan's, was the site of a season of picketing in an effort to force the park to abandon its decades-old Whites Only admission policy. The ongoing demonstrations were spearheaded by the student Nonviolent Action Group of Howard University, joined by white supporters who included residents of adjacent Bannockburn community and members of the AFL-CIO. The sit-in on the Glen Echo carousel resulted in the arrest of five Black student protesters and the court case wound its way to the Supreme Court, which ruled in 1964 that the arrest of the demonstrators violated the Fourteenth Amendment guarantee of equal protection.

You are invited to join a combined group from St. Dunstan's and Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill (Alexandria) on **Saturday, June 7 at 10 a.m.** for a tour of the historic Dentzel Carousel at Glen Echo Park where the demonstration began. We will hear a 45-minute ranger-led presentation about the history of the park and of the carousel, which culminated with the eventual integration of the park in 1961. Following the tour, we will have a **box lunch picnic** under the shade trees next to the carousel for a chance to share the experience and hear what it says to us about our collective past, our present and our hopes for the future.

Plentiful free parking is available in an adjacent lot. **RSVP to Patty Alexander by Sunday, June 1.** There is *no* cost for admission to the park, the tour, or the lunch!



*Artist's Reflection: "Praise God, all you shining stars"

This one was fun! I love the idea of the stars just dancing to praise God. I had some "silk paper" I'd made that looked like a night sky. On it I layered on some mesh fabric with stars and sparkly dots (leftover from a Halloween costume). Then made a few more stars from other materials, twisting them a bit to indicate movement. Hallelujah!
