

The Epistle: Hebrews 11:1-3, 8-16

Lector A Reading from the Book of Hebrews:

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old—and Sarah herself was barren—because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

The Gospel: Luke 12:32-40

Jesus said to his disciples, "Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

"Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.

The Nicene Creed

God of freedom, we pray for our nation, and all the nations of the world: For elected and appointed leaders, and for Federal workers, members of our Armed Forces, Foreign Service, and Emergency Services. Hear our prayers for the world.

God of Creation, we pray for the earth entrusted to our care: For the animals and birds, the mountains and oceans, and all creatures that have no voice of their own. Stir up in us a thirst to protect the earth and all its resources, that we may be faithful stewards of the beauty and abundance that you have given us. God of Creation.

Hear our prayers for the earth.

God of mercy, we pray for all in any kind of need or trouble: Those whose lives are closely linked with ours, and those to whom we are connected in the human family. We remember the peoples of Gaza, Haiti, Israel, Russia, South Sudan, Sudan, and Ukraine; refugees and displaced persons; victims and survivors of gun violence; those impacted by recent earthquakes, flooding, volcanoes, and wildfires; and the unhoused, unemployed, and underemployed. Help us honor our vow to respect the dignity of every human being.



We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Part of our rich Anglican tradition is the commemoration of significant figures in the history of The Episcopal Church who have set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us. These noteworthy individuals are remembered on the liturgical calendar of the Church, and their biographies are anthologized in Lesser Feasts and Fasts. This week we feature Florence Nightingale, whose feast day is August 12, and Jonathan Myrick Daniels, commemorated on August 14.

Florence Nightingale was an advocate for the poor and vulnerable: She devoted her life to the care of those in need, often at great personal sacrifice, becoming an icon of compassion against suffering. She is recognized as a saint due to her profound impact on nursing, hospital reform, and her life of Christian service. She revolutionized patient care advocating for proper sanitation, compassion, and dignity for the sick and wounded. And as a social reformer she addressed issues beyond medical care, such as improving soldiers' ability to send money home, establishing reading rooms, and ensuring educational opportunities for patients. Florence Nightingale was deeply religious, believing her nursing was a divine vocation and viewing nurses as "handmaidens of the Lord." Her mystical experiences and strong sense of God's calling were central to her work and spirituality. The Episcopal Church honors her as an embodiment of Christian service, sacrificial love, practical faith, and advocacy for the marginalized.

Jonathan Myrick Daniels is recognized as a saint and martyr in the Episcopal Church because of his exemplary Christian commitment, self-sacrifice, and courageous advocacy during the civil rights movement. Daniels, a seminarian, responded to Martin Luther King, Jr.'s call in 1965 for clergy and seminary students to aid in registering Black voters in Alabama. He became deeply involved in civil rights activities, helping to integrate churches and risking his safety to stand against racial injustice. On August 20, 1965, Daniels died while shielding 17-yearold Ruby Sales, a Black civil rights activist, from a shotgun blast during a confrontation in Hayneville, Alabama. Daniels took the full force of the attack, saving Sales' life. His death shocked the Episcopal Church and galvanized further support for the civil rights movement, highlighting the Church's role in advocating for justice and reconciliation. Daniels continually worked to integrate local churches and promote nonviolence, embodying the Gospel's call to love one's neighbor—actions that inspired both his contemporaries and later generations. He was added to the Episcopal Church calendar as a martyr in 1991, recognized for his faith-driven advocacy and ultimate sacrifice. ~ Curated by Ray Donnelly
