Lector A Reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, “**Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.**”

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever, **AMEN.**

Celebrating More Contemporary Saints



Enmegahbowh (c. 1813–1902) was the first Native American ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church. Born into the Ojibwe Nation near Rice Lake, Ontario, his name means “he who stands before his people.” Initially exposed to both Ojibwe spiritual traditions and Christianity, he later joined the Episcopal Church, becoming a deacon in 1859 and a priest in 1867.

Enmegahbowh is considered a saint in the Episcopal Church for his pioneering ministry and role as a cultural bridge-builder. He worked tirelessly among the Ojibwe in Minnesota, establishing missions, churches, and schools, and fostering understanding between Native and non-Native communities. Notably, he was a peacemaker during the U.S.-Dakota War of 1862, advocating for nonviolence and reconciliation.

His life exemplified faith, resilience, and a commitment to justice despite personal hardship and loss. The Episcopal Church commemorates him on **June 12**, honoring his legacy as a model of inclusivity, peacemaking, and service to the marginalized. Enmegahbowh’s work continues to inspire efforts toward reconciliation and respect for Indigenous leadership within the Church and beyond.
