

Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

Part of our rich Anglican tradition is the commemoration of significant figures in the history of The Episcopal Church who have set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us. These noteworthy individuals are remembered on the liturgical calendar of the Church, and their biographies are anthologized in Lesser Feasts and Fasts. This week we feature William Temple, whose feast day is this Thursday, November 6.

William Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury from 1942 to 1944, is honored in the Episcopal Church for his dynamic blend of Christian faith and social action. Known for his incarnational theology, Temple saw the presence of Christ in every aspect of daily life and dedicated himself to justice, education, and the welfare of all people. His leadership during challenging times and advocacy for unity among Christians left a lasting mark on both the Church and society. Temple's legacy endures in his tireless pursuit of social reform, his clear and accessible teaching, and his compassionate service. Through his actions and words, he inspired the Church to work for a society rooted in justice and love, expressing faith not only in worship but through concrete acts of service and unity. The Episcopal Church remembers him as a model of Christian courage and hope. ~ Curated by Ray Donnelly

Artist's Reflection: "Sing to the Lord a new song!" There is something uplifting (to me, anyway) about singing with other people. I'm sure there is a neurophysiological explanation for it, but in my imagination the vibrations from the other voices enter my very heart and bring out song from somewhere deep inside me – from deeper than when I'm just singing on my own. So, how delightful that this Psalm should come up for All Saints' Day? We can sing not just with each other, but with ALL the Saints gathered around us. A lovely thought.

This piece is made of painted papers. The "music" was drawn with ink onto colored tissue paper, cut into strips, then painted with matte acrylic medium to stiffen it so that it could be woven through the air. ~ Sue Carroll, *Liturgical Artist-in-Residence*
