The Epistle: Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16

Lector A Reading from the Book of Hebrews:

Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them; those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled; for God will judge fornicators and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have; for he has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we can say with confidence.

On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."



Celebrating More Contemporary Saints

This week we give thanks for the lives of several noteworthy individuals of deep faith who set an example of "saintly living" for the rest of us.

David Pendleton Oakerhater is recognized as a saint for his transformation from a Cheyenne warrior to a devoted Christian Deacon and missionary who served his people for over 50 years. After being imprisoned following the Indian Wars, he converted to Christianity, was ordained, and committed his life to ministry among the Cheyenne and Arapaho people, providing spiritual leadership and advocating peace and reconciliation. The Episcopal Church remembers him on **September 1.**

The Martyrs of New Guinea, honored on September 2, are venerated for their sacrifice during World War II. These clergy, teachers, medical staff, and layworkers (both indigenous Papuans and foreign missionaries) remained at their posts during the Japanese invasion, despite the danger, and were executed for their faith and service. Their steadfast commitment, even unto death, serves as a witness to courage and faithfulness in the face of persecution.

Bishop Paul Jones is recognized as a saint in the Episcopal Church because of his steadfast Christian pacifism, social activism, and courage in witness to the Gospel of peace. He publicly denounced war as unchristian during World War I, declaring that "war is unchristian," which led to his forced resignation as Bishop of Utah. Despite opposition, he continued ministering, working for justice, advocating for workers, and supporting conscientious objectors. His sainthood is rooted in: his prophetic and public advocacy for nonviolence and peace, even at great personal and professional cost; his lifelong service among marginalized communities, including miners, railroad workers, immigrants, and Native Americans; and his leadership in the Christian pacifist movement and efforts to support conscientious objectors and the cause of peace within the Church. The Episcopal Church honors him on **September 4**, recognizing his witness as a model of Gospel-centered peacemaking and justice. ~ *Curated by Ray Donnelly*
